## **MSHN/REGIONAL MATTERS**

### **Open Meetings Act – Continue to await finalization**

There have been no further updates to the Open Meetings Act that apply to MSHN's SUD OPB. NOTE: Governor Whitmer signed House Bill 4705, on May 2, 2022, which expands the Open Meetings Act to require certain state public bodies to create and maintain audio recordings of their meetings, expanding transparency and accountability. However, this is only applicable to state licensing boards, state commission panels, and state rule-making boards.

Therefore, as indicated in my previous reports, the only legal basis for a member of a public body to participate in a meeting via telephonic or video conferencing as a member of the public body, is if that member is absent due to military duty. Senate Bill 854 proposes to add back the medical condition as a circumstance for allowing remote participation.

Mid-State Health Network is still waiting for proposed legislation to be finalized prior to presenting any changes to the bylaws. MSHN will present an amendment to the SUD OPB in accordance with Section 7.2 as follows: " These bylaws may be amended by the members of the Board acting in accordance with the voting requirements set forth in Section 4.8. The agenda of the meeting shall set forth a summary of the proposed amendment(s) at **least fourteen (14) days prior to the date of the meeting. An affirmative vote to amend the Bylaws must be approved by the Board of Directors of MSHN.** Any amendment of these bylaws must be consistent with the Michigan law, the Code and the Intergovernmental Contract.

### **COVID Update**

The U.S Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has extended the federal public health emergency (PHE) for another 90 days effective July 15, 2022 – October 13, 2022. Extending or ending the PHE is the federal government's decision. The PHE can extend for up to 90-days at a time and has been renewed every 90 days for nearly 2 years. The federal government has indicated they will **give states 60 days' notice** prior to formally ending the PHE. Therefore, the current PHE 60-day notice to Michigan would need to occur by August 14, 2022, unless extended again past October 13, 2022.

On July 21, 2022, based on MSHN/MDHHS contract which includes state funding extended the "Parameters for Unusual Cost Reimbursement and Direct Support Professional Enhanced Compensation ("Premium Pay") During the Covid-19 Social

### **Opioid Health Home**

MSHN will be implementing an Opioid Health Home in Saginaw County beginning FY23. An Opioid Health Home (OHH) is a model of care that provides comprehensive care management and coordination services to Medicaid beneficiaries with an Opioid Use Disorder (OUD). The OHH will function as the central point of contact for directing patient-centered care across the broader health care system. OHH services will provide integrated, person-centered, and comprehensive care to eligible beneficiaries to successfully address the complexity of comorbid physical and behavioral health conditions. Beneficiaries will work with an interdisciplinary team of providers that includes a Health Home Director, Behavioral Health Specialist, Peer Recovery Coach /Community Health Worker/Medical Assistant, Medical Consultant, and Psychiatric Consultant. The OHH model is designed to increase access to health care, reduce unnecessary emergency room visits and unnecessary hospital admissions, increase hospital post-discharge follow up, elevate the role of peer recovery coaches and community health workers in particular to foster empathy, and improve overall health and wellness. Participation is voluntary, and enrolled beneficiaries may opt out at any time.

The Opioid Health Home receives reimbursement for providing the following federally mandated core services:

1. Comprehensive care management
2. Care coordination
3. Health promotion
4. Comprehensive transitional care
5. Individual and family support
6. Referral to community and social support services

### **Provider Network Adequacy Assessment (NAA)**

The Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) at 42 CFR Parts 438.68 and 457.1218 charges states holding managed care contracts with the development and implementation of network adequacy standards. Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) developed parameters for Pre-Paid Inpatient Health Plans (PIHPs) to ensure compliance with CFR requirements that includes time and distance standards as well as Medicaid Enrollee-Provider Ratio standards. MDHHS requires each PIHP to submit plans on how the standards will be effectuated by region. Understanding regional diversity, MDHHS expects to see nuances within the PIHPs to best accommodate the local populations served. PIHPs must consider at least the following parameters for their plans:

- 1) Maximum time and distance
- 2) Timely appointments
- 3) Language, Cultural competence, and Physical accessibility

In FY22, MSHN and the CMSHPs began assessing the adequacy of our regional Network. The NAA plan was updated with FY21 data points, additional analysis on the above three (3) elements, and inclusion of the COVID-19 pandemic on services and provider availability. After a review of the results, MSHN developed a list of recommendations to address identified gaps, areas for improvement and future demand considerations.

## **Health Services Advisory Group (HSAG) External Quality Review**

Health Services Advisory Group (HSAG), contracted by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) to conduct oversight of the Pre-paid Inpatient Health Plans (known as the External Quality Review), finalized the review of Mid-State Health Network (MSHN) in July. For FY2022, HSAG reviewed the following areas to ensure compliance with the Managed Care Rules.

- Provider Selection & Credentialing
- Confidentiality and Privacy
- Sub Contractual Relationships & Delegation
- Practice Guidelines
- Health Information Systems
- Quality Assurance and Performance Improvement Program
- Grievance and Appeal System

MSHN staff, along with the CMHSP's, provided a multitude of documents for review and conducted system demonstrations. The results of the review should be available by October 2022. MSHN expects the results of the review will demonstrate successful compliance and application of the regulations, with a few areas needing some improvements.

## **Recovery Housing Supplemental Payment**

During FY 2021 the Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) notified Mid-State Health Network (MSHN) there would be an approximately 38% decrease to its Block Grant (BG) funding allocation. The decrease left MSHN in a position of having to reduce FY 21 BG projected expenses to ensure the amount did not exceed the revised allocation total. To address the necessary adjustments needed, MSHN developed a series of BG reduction strategies which included lowering reimbursement rates and modifications to the BG benefit plan for certain services among other changes. As difficult as these changes were for MSHN to implement, the impact to our Provider Network was of utmost concern. Unfortunately, MSHN was and is not able to cover BG cost overruns with Medicaid and Healthy Michigan Plan surpluses. However, the FY 21 strategies implemented were successful and ultimately allowed MSHN to spend within the revised BG allocation.

As MSHN began the FY 22 budgeting process, the BG reduction plan remained in place however our Leadership Team Members had ongoing discussions throughout regarding the potential to offer stabilization to those providers experiencing loss revenue based on lower reimbursement rates and other changes. After careful analysis and tracking of FY 22 expenses, MSHN is projecting to spend less than our allocation and as such announced recovery housing providers were eligible for provider stabilization.

A one-time payment was calculated and issued in July 2022. MSHN will continue evaluating BG expenditures for the remainder of FY 22 and may perform a second round of one-time adjustments if funding permits.

## **STATE OF MICHIGAN/STATEWIDE ACTIVITIES**

### **Governor Whitmer Signs Tobacco Legislation**

On July 21, 2022, Governor Whitmer signed a legislation package to raise the state age for tobacco sales from 18 to 21. The legislative package brings Michigan in line with the federal Tobacco 21 legislation, raising the state age for tobacco sales from 18 to 21. The package amends several acts to raise the age of sale for retailers, prohibit anyone under 21 from entering a tobacco retail store, and prohibit tobacco sales through the mail to anyone under 21. The package also revises the disbursement of proceeds from the tax on cigarettes and other tobacco products.

House Bill 6108 amends the Youth Tobacco Act to raise the minimum legal sale of tobacco products, vapor products and alternative nicotine products from 18 to 21, in alignment in with federal law. Penalties for the sale of tobacco products to under-age individuals remain up to \$100 for the first offense, up to \$500 for the second offense, and up to \$2,500 for third and subsequent offenses. House Bill 6109 prohibits anyone under the age of 21 from entering a tobacco retail specialty store, like a cigar shop. A copy can be found [here](#).

Senate Bill 576 amends a portion of the Michigan penal code to require agents who distribute tobacco through the mail to verify that the recipient is 21 years of age, revising the previous age limit of 18. A copy can be found [here](#).

Senate Bill 577 is an amendment to the Age of Majority Act of 1971, which prescribes the rights, liabilities, and responsibilities of individuals aged 18-20. The legislation states that the act will not apply to the Youth Tobacco Act, which now prohibits tobacco use for those under 21, rather than 18. A copy can be found [here](#).

This year's report found that deaths associated with alcohol, drugs, and suicide took the lives of 186,763 Americans in 2020, a 20 percent one year increase in the combined death rate and the highest number of substance misuse deaths ever recorded for a single year...The report includes recommendations for steps the federal, state, and local governments should take to begin to reverse the deaths of despair crisis. They include:

#### **Invest in programs that promote health and prevent substance misuse and suicide:**

- Support in-school programs focused on students’ mental health and preventing substance use.
- Strengthen trauma-informed and culturally competent and linguistically appropriate programs within all youth-serving agencies, including the juvenile justice system.
- Strengthen the continuum of crisis intervention programs with a focus on the newly established “988” lifeline.
- Expand CDC comprehensive suicide-prevention efforts, including measures to strengthen economic supports, promote connectedness, and create protective environments.
- Build programs that address the social determinants of health and promote resilience in children, families and communities including those focused on the prevention of adverse childhood experiences.

#### **Address the substance misuse and overdose crises:**

- Promote harm-reduction policies to reduce overdose and blood-borne infections, including increasing access to syringe service programs, naloxone, and fentanyl test strips.
- Preserve and extend programs that create more flexible access to substance use disorder treatment during the pandemic.
- Direct funding from the opioid litigation settlement to primary prevention of youth substance misuse.
- Lower excessive alcohol use through policies that limit where and when alcohol can be served/purchased and by the use of alcohol excise taxes.

## **Transform the mental health and substance abuse prevention system**

- Increase access to mental health and substance use treatment through full enforcement of the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act.
- Combat stigma about mental health issues and access to service.
- Modernize physical and mental health services by aligning service delivery, provider payment, quality measures, and training toward the whole health of individuals and integrated care.
- Build grassroots community capacity for early identification and intervention for individuals with mental health and substance use disorders, including through community-based or non-traditional settings.”

## **National Institute for Health Care Management**

The National Institute for Health Care Management has released an array of infographics entitled Visualizing the Impact of the Opioid Overdose Crisis. Noting that “83% of all opioid deaths involved a synthetic product, these interactive graphics allow readers to explore how the crisis of overdose deaths involving opioid use has not only grown in magnitude since 2000, but has also changed in character.” The individual infographic titles are:

- Provisional Data Point to Increase in Synthetic Opioid Deaths During the Pandemic
- Total Opioid-related deaths rose again in 2020, one person dying every 7.75 minutes
- Third wave still going strong: Synthetic opioid deaths climbing rapidly; uptick in deaths from common Rx opioids in 2020 (First wave: Initially a crisis of prescription drugs; Second wave: Heroin becomes more of a factor; Third wave: The explosion of synthetic opioids is primarily driven by fentanyl)
- Opioid death rates climbed across races and ethnicity
- Opioid deaths increasingly involve synthetic opioids, including fentanyl
- Evolving combinations of substances responsible for opioid deaths
- Different geographic patterns in death rates by opioid type
- As the number of opioid deaths climbed, the crisis spread to all age groups, especially younger adults
- Strategies to reduce drug overdose deaths: Promote evidence-based solution from prevention to recovery

## Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Clinical Team Operational Updates – August 2022

### Prevention

- Ongoing implementation of web-based media campaign (My Life My Quit) information for youth vaping prevention with text # for quit support
- Hosted facilitator training for Wellness Initiative for Senior Education (WISE) curriculum that focuses on wellness during aging including mental health, prescription drugs and alcohol use. Fourteen provider staff took part and can begin WISE cohorts.
- **Formal Synar checks** were completed in 20 counties during the month of June, keeping in compliance with the federal and state Youth Tobacco Act requirements. The MSHN region was assigned 117 checks with 111 of those checks able to be completed. There were only 9 sales to youth inspectors (in 7 counties), which resulted in a sales rate of only **8.11%** (a major improvement over the FY21 sales rate of **20.4%**).
- Requested and approved for **\$25,000 in MDHHS surplus Block Grant funds** to offer Prevention providers staffing stabilization for Prevention staff. MSHN's Prevention team is working with providers on distributing these funds.
- Spent remainder of Tobacco Section funding (approx. \$1800) on increasing impressions during June for our existing vaping education web-based media campaign.
- Began planning for grant projects and spending in FY23.
- Inter-regional coordination ongoing through Prevention Coordinators.
- Review of prevention providers' entries into MPDS (the Michigan Prevention Data System) where prevention providers log their activities, persons served, etc.
- Provision of technical assistance and training to existing providers on best practices for prevention and on how to document those in MPDS.
- Attending coalition meetings across Region 5's 21 counties.
- Continued implementation of FY21-23 SUD Strategic plan.

### Treatment

- Supported MDHHS SUD site review from 6/13/2022 through 7/29/2022. **Scored 100% compliant on MDHHS SUD Site Review 7/29/2022.**
- Continuous evaluation of capacity, network adequacy, and gaps in service. **Community meeting in Montcalm to inform MSHN's next steps and issuance of RFPs.**
- Continued SUD Treatment Provider annual planning activities with FY23 budget reviews and contract recommendations for August Oversight Policy Board and September Board of Directors.
- Supported **Contingency Management Training** and implementation with 6 SUD Treatment Providers for FY22 and FY23 continuation.



- Evaluate changes in source of truth standards for QAPI Site Review Tools for SUD Treatment Provider network w. recommendations for FY23.
- Support revisions and additions for MSHN SUD Provider Manual for FY23 implementation.
- Continuing preparation for Opioid Health Home (OHH) in the Saginaw area for launch on 10/1/2022 (FY23).
- Ongoing participation in PIHP workgroup for SUD Residency and Financial Responsibility.
- Support MDOC collaboration to address process and service needs for individuals transitioning from prison/jail to the community.
- Ongoing support technical assistance needs with SUD treatment providers.
- Ongoing support of treatment providers with ASAM Continuum implementation.
- Continued Treatment Team attendance at prevention community coalition meetings.
- Ongoing support of treatment providers' strategies to stay open and viable during COVID with telemedicine, etc.
- Ongoing evaluation of opportunities to expand services for specialty populations of older adults, adolescents, veterans and military families.
- Ongoing monitoring of progress for FY21-23 SUD Strategic Plan.
- Coordinate and facilitate regional ROSC meetings, regional MAT workgroups meetings, regional WSS workgroup meetings, regional WM/residential workgroup and new outpatient provider meetings.
- Participation in the MDHHS MDOC Pilot Biweekly Check-in Meetings as well as the Opioid Treatment Ecosystem Community of Practice meetings related to MAT initiatives around the state.

#### Additional Activities in Q3:

- Ongoing coordination with statewide SUD Directors on consistency on 1) procedure for between-region transfers; 2) stigma reduction with name change to SUDS Directors (dropping the word "abuse").
- Oversight and coordination of SUD prevention and treatment teams and all activities listed above.
- Facilitated ongoing monthly meetings of MSHN Regional Equity Advisory Committee for Health (REACH).
- Michigan Department of Civil Rights implicit bias training, July 2022.
- Finalization of formal procedure for CMHs and SUD providers to refer to MSHN's Veteran Navigator.

#### Veteran Navigator Updates:

- Veteran Navigator (VN) connected 12 people who have served in the US Military to entitlements, services, and supports this quarter, including finding housing for a local vet.
- **A local veteran was connected to behavioral health resources after expressing suicidal thoughts to the Veteran Navigator; the VN used Mental Health First Aid to assess the situation and connect the person to care.**

- Attended SUD and suicide prevention coalition meetings throughout the region to inform MSHN's VN of local resources and relay VN supports and services to the community stakeholders in attendance.
- Shared best practices and lessons learned by attending statewide Veteran Navigator meetings.
- Strengthened access to services and supports available for people who have served and their families by ongoing development of a veteran and military families (VMFs) resource guide; the guide has been revised and promoted at the SUD Provider Meetings, through weekly Constant Contact newsletters, and on the MSHN website.
- Created webpage on MSHN site for VN services and supports.
- Collaborated with MSHN's UM & Treatment Depts. to update the veterans' eligibility and technical requirement section of the SUD provider manual, reducing its contents, providing links to VA eligibility criteria and creating a more user-friendly guide to services for the provider network.
- VN attended the 2022 Michigan Harm Reduction Summit, learning valuable skills and knowledge to aid in connecting VMFs to syringe service programs (SSPs) and other harm reduction supports in their community.

#### Grant Updates:

- **Scored 100% compliance with FY22 MDHHS State Opioid Response (SOR) site audit.**
- Earmarked **\$300,000 in SOR grant funds to support SUD prevention coalitions** in providing effective overdose education, distributing naloxone kits, fentanyl test strips, medication lock boxes and disposal pouches, and connecting communities to harm reduction resources, e.g., Gratiot's SUD prevention coalition used these funds to provide local law enforcement officers with over 12,000 pairs of puncture-resistance gloves and gave 100 older adults individual medication lock boxes through the local senior centers.
- Two MAT programs (Eaton & Ingham Cos.) provided jail-based services to a total of 88 individuals this quarter with SOR grant funds.
- Developed process to install at least 11 Narcan vending machines throughout the region (via SOR grant funds), beginning at the health departments in Tuscola & Ionia counties.
- Improved access to syringe service and harm reduction programs in Lansing by allocating \$60,000 in PA2 funds to Lansing Syringe Services & Punks with Lunch.
- Support of Red Project in Newaygo County.
- Earmarked \$150,000 in COVID grant funds to the provider network to support purchase of new/improved telehealth equipment, improving quality of and access to SUD supports and services.
- Confirmed dates for two clinical trainings for the SUD provider network this fall (via COVID grant funds): Eye Movement Desensitization & Reprocessing (EMDR) & Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASDs).
- Allocated \$15,000 in COVID grant funds to support 50 peer recovery coaches in obtaining state certification.
